Opening the door to residential valuation with the Sava certificate

What is your current profession?

I worked as a general practice surveyor for several years, gaining a bit of commercial property experience as well, before becoming a Chartered Surveyor through a Facilities Management pathway.

What kind of business do you currently undertake?

It was my goal to become a registered valuer and although I could have gone back through the Royal Institution of

Chartered Surveyors (RICS), it would have taken me a long time to achieve registered valuer status through that pathway.

I was looking for training that I could undertake in my own time and that's exactly what the Certificate in Residential Valuation offered me. There was no time pressure, which was great, and I could fit my online learning around my existing commitments.

I can say that I now feel confident carrying out valuation work. The next step is to get out and about and learn by doing.

The certificate is delivered entirely online - how did you find it?

I started doing the course during the Covid-19 lockdowns and it was a huge benefit being able to easily dip in and out of the learning.

There is no practical element to the course, so you have to be comfortable putting theory into practice yourself, but I can say that I now feel confident carrying out valuation work. The next step is to get out and about and learn by doing.
